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What happened?

The wardens, PCC, Readers, staff, and others involved in leading various groups and ministries met at St Paul's Convent (Selly Park) on Saturday 24 September 2022. We were also joined by Guy Donegan-Cross (Diocesan Director of Learning for Discipleship and Mission).

What is discipleship?

God grows the church, we join in with His mission. Our task is given in Matthew 28:

Jesus said, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you.'

Being and making disciples is the Church's central task. Disciples pray with passion. Disciples worship. Disciples love the church and serve her with energy and joy. Disciples

The best way to grow the church is to grow disciples

give lavishly. Disciples care about the poor and bring about justice. Disciples take risks for the kingdom of God

So, if we focus on being and making disciples first, the rest will follow.



Every church needs to ask itself two questions:

What is our plan for discipleship? And, is it working?

Some key thoughts and ideas:

Information is not enough. We need information, modelling, sending out, accountability.

Discipleship is caught, rather than taught. 'Tell me, I'll forget. Show me, I'll remember. Involve me, I'll understand.'

A plan must be open enough for newcomers, and offer high accountability. Discipleship is largely about developing habits which form you over time.

Our shared language of discipleship

After Guy's introduction to discipleship we collected our shared language of what 'discipleship' means to us:

Serving where God has sent you.

Having our identity in Christ – being rooted in him.

Acting and looking like Christ, being authentic as individuals and church.

Intentionally seeking to follow Jesus in every aspect of our life.

Being willing to learn from others and be accountable to them.

We seek to follow Jesus because of everything he has done for us; he is our primary influencer.

A follower is not just about activities but a growing relationship.

Learning to love the Lord our God with all our heart, soul, mind and strength – and to love our neighbour as ourselves.

Learning and growing and changing our perspective on life.

Adopting appropriate spiritual disciplines that transform us.

Taking steps of faith to help extend God's kingdom.

Deciding to follow Jesus and then continuing with a daily decision to keep on following Jesus.

Seeking to be involved in Jesus' ministry and mission – serving others (inside and outside the church) – empowered by the Spirit.

Intentionally following Christ.

Whole life joy, surprises, challenges, security.

Being led by the Spirit - a Spirit-filled life.







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Notes from the dreaming

Jesus in centre - m-g-s going round

Authentic Christian community – visible, loving attractive, outward looking, serving

A church teeming with life – people receive what they need – where they are at – connecting with people whoever they are – where they are at – (need equipping and training in that)

Partnering with the community – using their strengths too

Evangelism confidence

People falling over themselves to get in (to know Jesus & his kingdom)

Praying for 5 people – regular courses/enquires training

Welcome – gospel – friendly become follower of Jesus

Active in community with outreach events to attract non-believers

Communicating about activities

More diversity – celebrating cultures and gifts

Young people – 20 regularly joining, 14 confirmed, 4 baptised.

Vibrant community routed in Jesus and are growing to be more like him – clear pathway, mentoring and small groups – courses – training in contemporary issues/culture

Big church – little church – moving away from homegroups?? Change shape of small groups.

Pathway – for people to get to next "stage"

Names – lanyards? More intergenerational getting to know each other

Outward thinking - not always about ourselves

Learn together as community, mentoring, spiritual growth

Mesh of generations with all involved

Empowering and equipping people – generosity of sharing gifts with other churches/community

People are equipped to confidently share their faith in everyday life

Sending not always geographical, but equipping to be useful in places they are – Selly Park, UK abroad, workplaces, neighbourhoods, church plants, socialising, moving away

John 10:9 –Come Holy Spirit and send us into the world – dream in 5 years' time people will really want to come to church – enthusiasm – Holy Spirit to come in power – prayers based around us listening to God – plans and practice based round that – growing in confidence in the gospel and sharing – intentional discipleship – transformed lives – training – different people groups – care for the vulnerable – masses of youth children and under 40s – lots of new and growing believers – more representative of community, city and midlands – social class – accents – colour – education – going out into the world – school, college, workplace, mission partners

Family unit – trust – honesty – knowing each other, caring – no judgement – openness – differences didn't matter

Food – feeding community, school children, each other – more times together where we eat

Going deeper – theology prayer worship, visible in the community, relationships

Intergenerational – every age worshipping together, young serving each other, awareness of needs, older people mentoring young people, if we didn't have Sunday services how would we function as a church?

What will be?

'One thing'

Before the Away Day everyone was asked to prepare a single sentence answering the question 'what one thing do we need to do to be more effective in discipleship?'

Here are those sentences...

Share more stories from the front of discipleship in action, to encourage each other, so short testimonies/examples from the congregation, as part of our Sunday services.

Audit each activity including individual house groups: are prayers being answered, how are they meeting Matthew 28.19-20, is there fruit, should we continue with it?

Prioritise our quiet time with God in order to deepen our relationship and grow in knowledge and understanding of the gospel.

Participate in activities/projects alongside non-members away from our building.

Develop and strengthen 1-2-1 ministry.

Ask 'who is catching what from whom?' (e.g. 1 Thessalonians 1.6-7, imitators and models).

Encourage the pattern of discipleship in 2 Timothy 2.2 in small groups and 1-2-1 relationships.

Ensure all the things we do within the church are aimed at and successful in making, growing, sending disciples.

Spend more time with God as individuals in personal devotion / quiet time, getting closer to God, hearing from Him.

Have more conversations about Jesus with others – so to promote that how about some regular/frequent testimony slots in morning services.

Help individual members of the congregation grow in their personal discipleship journey.

Engage in Spiritual Warfare.

Meet people where they are at.

Help us understand who we are as a result of who God is and what he has done to enable us to live by faith and overcome personal struggles.

Encourage everyone to intentionally read their Bibles regularly during the week in some structured way (e.g. using notes or a Bible study scheme) so that we are all listening to and growing more like Jesus frequently, not just on Sundays.

Support house group leaders and groups as safe places with the focus on growing as disciples.

Encourage/challenge those who are just continuing on with God, who are not high maintenance so might get overlooked.

Be more confident in our faith.


1. Overall, do you think the Away Day was a positive or negative experience?

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

2. What did you think of...


No-one rated any of the areas 'Awful' or 'Poor'.




3. Outcomes: Are you more encouraged in how God has provided for us in the past?




4. Outcomes: Are you more inspired with a fresh sense of purpose and vision of how God is leading us?




5. Outcomes: Do you have a greater understanding of what's going well and what our challenges are?



6. Outcomes: Do you have a greater sense of what our next steps might be for making, growing and sending disciples of Jesus?




7. Do you think we should adopt 'making, growing, sending disciples of Jesus' as our mission statement?



When asked 'if not why not' some of the comments mentioned...

- 'Disciple' is an unusual word that requires explanation (maybe use 'follower' instead, though that loses some of the nuance) people unfamiliar with the church may not know what it means.
- I feel something more directly Jesus focused would come across better (e.g. to know Jesus better and make Him better known).
- Does the church family want to be involved in personal discipleship?
- Sending implies being sent elsewhere but some disciples are sent to the places where they already are. It sort of implies greater value to the traditional sense of sent - missionary, vicar etc which I think is counterproductive.
- It is a perfectly good statement but I don't feel I own it yet.

What's next?

Please continue to pray for discernment and wisdom – we need to ensure that we make the most of the Away Day and the time and effort everyone put into coming.
